THE HIGH SCHOOL YEARS Homing in on the key challenges

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1) A whole new game.

Need to be clearheaded about this choice — difficult to reverse course.

- In our state, legislation leaves the whole issue of refusing/accepting credits to the discretion of local school boards & administrators; you need to inform yourself about how it works in your state.
- Think your teen may change her mind? Before you start homeschooling, you may want meet with your schoolboard to learn about their policies

Changes in your student

— A period of intense physical / emotional / intellectual change

— The pushback

Outside pressures: credits for graduation, college requirements, etc.

— Content balancing student's interests & aims with general needs Changes to your role

- *Keeper of the plan, the strategy*
- Keeper of educational values & standards
- Counselor & Record-keeper

2) Your student's social needs

Easy to underestimate the importance for your student of contact with peers.

- *It's probably the number-one reason kids ask to go back to school.*
- *End up sacrificing your own academic standards.*
- Solution: Get connected to your local homeschooling communities.
- Seek out local homeschooling groups in your area: Facebook groups, church groups, Meetup.com, etc.
- *Go further: Look for co-ops / weekly meet-ups / activities. —Host some-thing yourself!*
- -Look beyond the homeschooling world: what's in your community?

3) Academics.

When your students were little, the focus was getting them excited about learning; this objective is more valid than ever during the H.S. years!

— Our solution: Hold high standards — help your student achieve really high standards. (Prepare to be surprised...)

Make an educational plan for your student.

— Cover all the subjects across the curriculum.

Three tracks (opposite) — *tailor to your student's goals.*

— What if your student's goals are not so clear?

For coursework, lots of options:

-Online—asynchronous vs. live/interactive

- *Co-ops, college classes, "learning pods"*
- -Build-your-own (build courses using external resources, like Great

Courses, Coursera, etc.)

— Curriculum in a box (Bob Jones Grade 9, Memoria Press Grade 11)

Watch your student closely:

- If you see signs of struggle, re-evaluate your choices.
- Get to the root cause:
 1) Is your student overbooked?
 2) Are there fundamentals (skills, knowledge) not being addressed?

Find the best teachers.

— Tempting to focus on course types: AP, dual enrollment, co-op, etc. but that's not the priority.
